It was an absolute work of marvel the way he turned what could have been a travelogue into an exciting personal experience for all to behold. Not only did Paul have a wonderful selection of slides showing the scape of Belize and our favorite subject, orchids, in particular the native orchids of Belize, he brought to us a number of interesting subject matter such as the fuzzy friendly looking caterpillar that made him ache from his arm to his leg.

This was a presentation we will not soon forget; a number of members voiced their pleasure at the presentation. This month our Guest Speaker is Carson Whitlow, from Adel Iowa. His presentation is titled "A History of Blue Cattleya Breeding."

Carson comes from a long history of growing and breeding Cattleyas; Carson's work with blue Cattleyas and Laelias in the 1960's laid the groundwork for many of today's hybridizing efforts. Today much of his focus has expanded into Paphiopedilum and Cypripedium orchids, plus he is the host for probably the best orchid link web site, Orchid Mall.

Having Carson as our guest speaker is through a cooperative arrangement with our friends in Mesa, Arizona, The Orchid Society of Arizona. Our joining together makes his trip a whole lot more interesting and it ends up costing us a whole lot less. Here is Carson's biography:

"Carson became interested in orchids in 1958 when he was a sophomore in college. The following years he worked on the weekends and summers reporting orchids for a firm in Springfield, Illinois. After graduating in 1960, Carson went to Santa Ana, California to work for the prestigious firm of B. O. Bracey and Company. A year later, he changed his direction and entered upon a career in government service with the Orange County (California) Health Department. Career-wise, he has been an administrator in public health since that time, changing in 1988 to highway safety. Educationally, he has a Bachelors of Arts degree in education and mathematics (1960) fromBlackburn College, Carlinville, Illinois, and a Master of Science of Public Health degree in biostatistics (1973) from the

University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, North Carolina.

After leaving the Bracey firm, Carson established his own collection, mostly of blue Cattleyas, with which he undertook hybridizing in association with Fred A. Stewart, Orchids, in San Gabriel, California. From 1964 thru 1969, he produced in excess of 60 blue cattleya hybrids, many of which are still in collections, arising from the original seedlings or as mericlones. Many are used as basic parents in todays blue Cattleya breeding.

In 1973, with his move to central Iowa, Carson took a distinct change in direction, working with the hardy terrestrial orchids, primarily the Cypripediums and Calopogons. His work resulted in the first registered artificial hybrids of Cypripedium in 1987 and Calopogon in 1991. He continues to hybridize these genera and has built a small business, Cyp. Haven, as retail outlet for his work.

In 1995, Carson's interest in the internet and an easier means of finding orchid related sites on the world wide web brought about the birth of "The Orchid Mall," which today has become the definitive link site for orchids on the internet.

Carson's hybrid work is recognized throughout the world. He has published over 30 articles in U.S. and European journals. He has been giving presentations on his breeding and propagation for over 25 years, throughout the United States, Canada, and in Scotland at the 14th World Orchid Congress in 1993. He is truly a world-class hybridizer, author and speaker."

His wife Lorna will accompany Carson. We are looking forward to what is expected to be an outstanding presentation.

Complimenting the presentation, Dave Reid of Reid's Orchids will provide our plant table. We can't expect the table to be loaded with blue Cattleyas but we can expect a table of some of the finest Cattleyas in San Diego County.

2003 SPRING SHOW - BUDGET

2003 Spring Show Director

After going through a very detailed accounting of last year's show expenses we are now prepared to go forward with the proposed budget for next year's show. Your Board of Director's has gone over the detailed version of the following proposed budget and has authorized submittal to the general membership for final approval. Approval of the budget will allow this Show Director the necessary financial backing to put next year's show together. At the next meeting, September 3rd, you, the membership in attendance will be asked to approve this budget.

Some information needs to be provided to explain the rationale of this proposed budget. Obviously enough, the budget is an outgrowth of last year's budget, so a comparison of last year's actual expenses is held up against similar anticipated expenses for next year. Where known expenses and income are anticipated to remain the same, the same amount as last year is used. Other than that, an inflation factor of 10% is used.

Our show location will remain at the Scottish Rite Memorial Center. Vendor fees will not be raised. General admission will be raised from \$5 to \$6.

SEPTEMBER/OCTOBER CHECKLIST

Cattleya Despite the shortening days and lowering angle of the sun, September can still be one of the hottest months. Water and fertilizer need to be in balance with heat and light. The alert grower will notice, however, that his or her plants are beginning to slow down a bit. Growths are maturing, and the sheaths are giving the promise of the next six-months' bloom. Check plants for potting needs for the last time this season. Any in dire need should be potted, even some that may be on the cusp, as there is just enough of the growing season left to allow the plants to establish before the days start to get really short and cold. This is the month for purples derived from Cattleya labiata breeding to flower. If you are short on flowers, look into this group. There is nothing that can quite match this type for beauty and fragrance. They are easy to grow, too. Plants summered outdoors should begin to be prepared to be brought back into the winter growing area. Clean the plants up and be on the lookout for any pests they may have picked up during the summer. Treat as necessary.

Cycnoches This little-known and underappreciated genus, which can have male or female flowers, is at its best in the autumn. Two of the spectacular varieties are Cycnoches loddigesii, with its large brown flowers resembling a prehistoric bird, and Cycnoches ventricosum, the swan orchid. This last one has large, fragrant green flowers. The biggest problem, culturally, will be red spider mite infestations that require immediate attention. Plants are quite seasonal, requiring heavy

watering in the growing season and then a drier dormant winter season.

Cymbidium Through diligent modern breeding programs, the cymbidium season gets stretched longer and longer. Now we can expect to have flowers open as early as September and October. Stake inflorescences and move the plants to a shadier location to help the flowers develop successfully. Because the plants will have warmth tolerance "built in" genetically, keeping the plants as cool as possible will help prevent bud curl. For the midseason varieties, inflorescences should be initiated by now. Feed plants on a regular schedule with a balanced fertilizer (20-20-20) and shade the plants lightly.

Dendrobium This is a good season for hybrids of the Dendrobium phalaenopsis and Dendrobium canaliculatum types. Both are capable of putting on tremendous shows of long-lasting flowers. Fertilize with a low-nitrogen formula to promote the best flowers. Dendrobium phalaenopsis can get tall and top heavy, suggesting an attractive and heavy container would be appropriate for this type.

Lemboglossum bictoniense Both Lemboglossum Odontoglossum) (syn. bictoniense and its hybrids bloom in this season. Lemboglossum bictoniense is a showy species from Mexico that has three different color forms: sulphureum (green with white lip), album (brown with white lip) and roseum (brown with a pink lip). It is a vigorous grower with tall inflorescences of many flowers, and imparts to its progeny (as seen in Odcdm. Bittersweet and Odm. bicross) ease of culture, warmth tolerance and eye-catching patterns. They make a prime candidate for odontoglossum beginners and advanced alike.

Paphiopedilum Standard, green-leaved

paphiopedilums begin to show their bloom sheaths this month. Late-season heat waves can blast these early sheaths, so be observant about proper cooling and air circulation. As with the rest of your plants that may have been summered outdoors, it is time to prepare for their move inside. Clean each plant and implement pest-control practices. Repotting, if necessary, is appropriate.

Phalaenopsis The bulk of this season's growth is being ripened this month, with growers in cooler climates seeing the first emerging inflorescences. Some night heating may be necessary in the cooler areas. Begin to watch watering more carefully, and reduce feeding proportionately with reduced watering needs. An extra dose of phosphorus and potassium, such as a bloom-booster or high-acid-type fertilizer, is beneficial.

Rossioglossum grande Once known as Odontoglossum grande, this is a spectacular orchid with six to eight flowers up to 8 inches across. Often known as the tiger orchid, it has bright golden yellow flowers heavily marked with chestnut brown barring. The plants are beautiful with a grey-green cast to the foliage, which is borne on succulent pseudobulbs. It prefers hot and wet summers with cooler, even down to 40 F, dry winters. Grow under filtered light. Watch for snails and slugs that eat the flowers, pseudobulbs and leaves.





THE AMERICAN ORCHID SOCIETY NEEDS YOU (and Why You Should Join)

Eighty-one years ago, a small group of people met in space rented from Harvard University. They were orchid enthusiasts, and they were the founders of a Society that has grown to be the largest special-interest horticultural organization in the world

At this point, you are probably expecting little more than a press release for the AOS. That would be easy to write. The AOS publishes three acclaimed magazines: *Orchids*, the monthly magazine for members; *Awards Quarterly*, a pictorial review of awards from the AOS judging system; and *Lindleyana*, a venue for scientific reports on orchids. The new International Orchid Center in Florida sounds magnificent, housing AOS offices, library collections and archives, and boasting three and half acres of botanical gardens and 8,000 square feet of greenhouses.

But you can read about the AOS at its informative Web site, www.orchidweb.org.

Instead, I want to talk opinion - or why you should give the AOS your support in the form of membership.

You might ask, "What do I get for plonking down my money?" Most tangibly, you will receive *Orchids*, a publication of orchid articles, photos and advertisements. Admittedly, some months it bores me silly; I skim the ads, look at the photos, and put it away. The same goes for the Smithsonsian or the Natural History magazines, to which I subscribe. Any publication aimed at a broad readership is bound to miss my interests every now and again. But some months, I steal any moment I can to read it, compulsively, comprehensively, letting my toddler sit in the high chair after breakfast and please just wait another moment while Mommy finishes this page.

But the AOS is more than a magazine. It is also a judging system that enlivens our shows, drives breeders to excel, and gives hobby growers cultural goals to which they can aspire. Certainly, there are flaws. Something that looks fabulous in the cold snows of the Midwest might not get a second look in tropical Florida or coastal California. Judges are human. I would postulate that the orchid world is more interesting because of AOS judging. And judging battles make good gossip for the rest of us.

Beyond judging, beyond the publications, the AOS is an advocate for all of us who grow orchids. It strives to educate the public, which, by the way, is a stated goal of many local orchid societies. The AOS supports orchid research; while you may claim you don't care about the latest taxonomical revision of Phalaenopsis, I would remind you that plenty of people last century thought it was stupid when a certain class of Cypripedium got the new name Paphiopedilum. Much orchid research will affect you, even if only indirectly via breeders and nurseries.

And now I come to one of two sticky topics that seem to rouse the most controversy: conservation. The AOS plays a prominent role in orchid conservation. For example, when the USDA revised its orchid importation regulations, its representatives met with the AOS as the premier orchid organization in the country; then it sent representatives to the AOS general meeting to report on revised rules.

Okay, maybe you don't agree with the importation regulations. Without AOS intervention, perhaps those regulations would have been worse. Maybe you don't agree with AOS conservation policies. Tell your AOS representative! It is your AOS representative's duty to convey your opinion to the AOS and to the AOS's conservation committee. Your voice will be heard by the AOS, where it might be ignored as insignificant by the US government.

Of course, like any governmental bureaucracy, the AOS spends money, your money. And here is the second topic about which I have heard complaints: the International Orchid Center.

It's in Florida; they're ignoring the West Coast.

It's a waste of money.

It's too extravagant; the AOS doesn't need a special facility with over three acres of gardens.

I say it is about time that the AOS is open to members and to the public. It is about time that the extensive AOS library and archives are accessible. It is about time that the AOS has a showcase for orchids. The American Rose Society is affiliated with test gardens all over the country; the AOS should have a venue for showing the public these plants we love so well. Because the AOS is the largest horticultural organization (and because it received generous monetary and plant donations), it should have a facility that reflects this status in the horticultural world.

Of course, I would love to have the IOC within driving distance. But I have to acknowledge that many large donations came from Florida, not the least of which was the Vaughn estate. As a West Coast inhabitant, I am reassured to see prominent West-Coast names listed on committees and as trustees; growers on the West Coast do have a voice.

Having touted the virtues of the AOS, I would like to finish with a few words about the responsibilities we all have as orchid growers. Just as it is a civic duty of US citizens to vote or serve on a jury, you might consider supporting the AOS and other orchid organizations as a civic duty of an orchid grower. After all, without orchid societies, large and small, orchid growing could be a very lonely hobby indeed.


