General Meeting, January 7th, 7:30 pm Mary Gerritsen: Miniature Orchids and How to Grow Them Text by Debby Halliday, First VP

Happy New Year! I can't believe it's already 2020! We have an excellent speaker lined up. Mary Gerritsen, PhD, will be talking to us about miniature orchids and how to grow them. If you are anything like me, your orchid collection always threatens to outgrow your available space. Miniatures are a great solution – more orchids in less space!

Miniature orchids, defined by Mary as those species whose individual growths are smaller than 6 inches (not including the inflorescence), are a popular choice for orchid hobbyists with limited growing space. In contrast to many of their larger counterparts, many miniature orchids are attractive in or out of bloom. Mary's lecture will cover many of her favorite species as well as the challenges and rewards of growing miniature orchids.

Gerritsen is an independent Marv biotechnology consultant who has been growing orchids (mostly species) on and off for more than 30 years. Since relocating to the San Francisco Bay area in 1997, she started a collection of small cool growing miniature species such as Masdevallias, Porroglossums, Lepanthes, and other assorted tiny gems. She also has a second intermediate greenhouse, filled with larger species such as Angraecoids, Dendrobiums, Oncidiums, Laelias, Phalaenopsis, and Bulbophyllums. She loves to see orchids growing in situ, and has made it her mission over the last few years to see as many as possible, with trips to see and photograph orchids (and other flora as well) in Canada, many parts of the USA and Mexico, and countries in Central America, South America, South East Asia, western Australia, and Europe, as well as South Africa and Madagascar.

She is the co-author of several botanical books: Masdevallias, Gems of the Orchid World; Calochortus, Mariposa Lilies and their Relatives; A Compendium of Miniature Orchid Species; A Bay Area Guide to Orchids and their Culture; and The American Orchid Society Guide to Orchids and their Culture, with fellow San Francisco Orchid Society member and well known photographer, Ron Parsons.

Mary frequently lectures to orchid societies in the San Francisco Bay area and, on occasion, other societies throughout the US and Canada. She is on the board of directors of the Orchid Digest, the Chief Operating Officer and Treasurer of the Orchid Conservation Alliance, and is also a member of the American Orchid Society, the San Francisco Orchid Society, the Peninsula Orchid Society and the Pleurothallid Alliance. It is a treat to have her visit us and you should come away inspired. We'll get the plant table from Andy's with an emphasis on interesting miniatures.

You are also invited to join us for dinner at the Prado Restaurant at 5:45pm. Please send me a text or email by Friday, Jan 3, if you want to come. (debhallid@gmail.com, 858-353-5392). As always, dinner is on you, but the conversation is free. This is a wonderful way to get to know our very interesting speakers on a more personal basis. Plant registration will be Friday afternoon from 3 to 8 PM and again Saturday morning from 8 to 9:30 AM. Please bring in your plants as early as possible so we can have the room set up and ready for judging at 10:00 Saturday morning. A complete registration schedule is available on our web site should you wish to start early or, if you are like me, bring your plants the day of the show and fill out the registration on site. There will be volunteers available to help with registrations if you have questions. AOS judging will be available at this show for any wanting to participate.



Ribbon judging starts at 10:00 Saturday morning and I would encourage our members to consider participating as judges. Just be there by 10:00 and let Pam Peters know you are interested in joining a team. It is a good way to meet members of the society and to learn from them. Judging not only considers the flower and its beauty, but also the plant itself; it can even help you learn about how to grow such a plant. I know because I have picked a few tips during judging about how to grow orchids.

We need your help to set up and run this show. It's a lot of work starting with set up Friday afternoon and ending with take down Sunday afternoon. In between, we need help with security, sales, kid's corner, and a number of other functions that need your support. A list of all the jobs available is on our web site under the "Volunteers" tab.

Orchids will be available for sale at this show, so bring your money. A number of local vendors will have plants for sale and members will be allowed to sell as well. If you wish to sell orchids at this show, please contact us in advance. Any plants offered for sale will need to comply with our bar code





system. You need to contact Myra DeTate (treasurer@sdorchids.com) to obtain the necessary tags at least 2 weeks in advance of the show.

Our conservation group will have a booth at the show to raise money for their efforts. If you have plants to donate, please bring them in Friday afternoon or contact Betty Kelepecz (bettypk@aol.com) or Ron Kaufmann (rkaufmann@gmail.com) to make other arrangements.

One last thing: please consider volunteering to help with set up on Friday afternoon and with take down on Sunday afternoon. A few extra hands would go a long way towards helping out.

Getting Ready for Summer Text by Bruce Berg

Now that San Diego's winter is almost over and we know that our plants will soon begin to start growing again we need to prepare our plants for the season when many of them will begin a period of rapid growth.

Some of us have kept our plants inside where they have been protected against cold wet conditions that are bad for orchids. The first thing to do is a bit of Spring cleaning: look over the area where we are going to move our plants for the summer. Do a check to see that the area can provide the basic requirements your plants will need: make sure light level is appropriate to the type of plant and check benches or mounting areas for structural soundness. Consider spraying with a fungicide like Physan 20 or diluted Clorox solution. Physan recommends using Physan 20 (1 tsp/52gal) in water barrels for algae control and for spraying walkways.

If you have a spraying or watering system, check and clean filters and valves. Test to make sure everything works. Test water quality if you are using RO or DI water. Check your drainage system to make sure you don't have a potential mosquito problem.

Check the plants over for bugs and any leaf damage. I get some sunburn as the days get longer and the sun angle gets higher.

My trigger point for moving plants is when nighttime temps start getting into the upper 40's for catts and the rest when temps at night hit 50. If I have bloomers in the greenhouse earlier, then they go outside

earlier too. Plants in bud may stay indoors until they bloom. Really, it's the growers call. These are just my guidelines.

Check your plants for green tips on the ends of the roots. That is the indicator that the plant is ready to start growing. If it is growing over the edge of the pot, consider if you want to divide and repot. I would think that our speakers will cover this topic at the upcoming winter show by some of our experienced growers, so, volunteer and be there to attend the presentation when your shift is over.

There is another related item about outstanding culture and recognition of good things happening in our society: I'd like to congratulate Anita and Jerry Spencer on their 50th Wedding Anniversary.
