Jack Zhu: The Form and Color of Asian Cymbidium

Jack Zhu is an orchid hobbyist from the Los Angels area in California. He grows many varieties of orchids, focusing on Asian cymbidiums. He is also very interested in the culture and history of Asian cymbidium.

Jack is currently an Associate Judge in the AOS Pacific South Judging Region and has more than twenty AOS awards for Asian cymbidium.

Jack will be giving us his talk: The Form and Color of Asian Cymbidium. During the talk,



Jack will give a brief introduction of the Asian cymbidium history as well as the main species typically accepted in the Asian cymbidium culture. Then, Jack will go into details about the various flower forms and colors of several Asian cymbidium. Finally, Jack will give us a sneak peak into another talk he is currently working on: The Leaf Variegation of Asian Cymbidium.





#### A Brief Trip to Japan Text by David Vandenbroek, 1<sup>st</sup> VP

Imagine being in a room surrounded by a mesmerizing display of vibrant orchids, each with its unique charm and grace – but with one special twist: none of the orchids on display at this show were in bloom! That was my experience earlier this month when I embarked on an unforgettable journey to Japan, where I had the incredible opportunity to attend the Japan Fūkiran Society's annual *Neofinetia falcata* show in Hamamatsu.

Neofinetia falcata (or, if you're a progressive heretic who believes what the taxonomists say and actually moves on with the times, *Vanda falcata*) is commonly called "furan" or "wind orchid" in Japan. Registered varieties get the upgraded name "Fūkiran", which roughly translates to "Orchid of the Rich and Noble" or perhaps "Orchids That Will Bring Wealth". The Japan Fūkiran Society annually ranks these orchids in a published listing known as the Meikan Chart; presently, there are around 300 registered Fūkiran varieties.

What sets these orchids and their shows apart is that they are meant to be appreciated when they are not in bloom. Unlike traditional orchid displays that focus on the blossoms, Fūkiran enthusiasts find beauty in the leaves, roots, and unique characteristics of the plants. The wild-type wind orchid resembles a typical vanda, with all-green, pointed leaves and green root tips. However, natural mutations have led to changes in plant morphology, and any deviation from the wildtype is eagerly collected and appreciated. Leaf shape, variegation, root color, and tsuke (the shape of the ridge where the leaf joins the rest of the plant) are the four main factors that enthusiasts look for when evaluating these remarkable orchids.

One of the fascinating aspects of Fūkiran is their limited availability. Since very few types of mutations reliably breed true through seed propagation (which only became available in the recent past), obtaining these prized varieties has traditionally relied on plant division or wild collection. The fact that over a few hundred years of collection has only resulted in ~300 recognized varieties speaks to the rarity of these mutations.

In addition to the orchids themselves, the judges in these shows also evaluate the pots in which the plants are displayed and the quality, shape, and size of the moss ball that cradles the orchids. Fancy pots, priced as low as \$100 and ranging into the thousands, become an integral part of the judging criteria. Without the right pot, even the most splendid orchid may find it difficult to win in these shows.

The Fūkiran show spanned two eventful days. On the first day, participants registered their plants, enjoyed a bento box lunch, witnessed the judging process, and took part in a charity auction. The second day featured

the presentation of awards, another bento lunch, and a second, highly exciting auction. Although participating in the auctions was a bit nerve-wracking, especially since everything was conducted in Japanese (a language I don't speak), I was able to participate; it was a thrilling experience. Some of the orchids at the second auction fetched staggering prices, surpassing \$3,000 USD for a single small plant - a testament to the allure and value placed on these exquisite wind orchids..

I could spend countless pages about my trip and the historical significance of these plants in Japan, or discuss the new breeding efforts

taking place in Korea, or give more details about how these plants are judged. However, I'll leave some of those fascinating details for our speaker for August, Satomi Kasahara.

Satomi, who hails from Japan and now resides in

Santa Barbara, has an intimate connection to the world of Neos through her father's involvement on the board of the Japan Fūkiran Society. Both Satomi and her brother, Daisuke, who I met on this trip, are involved in the cultivation and distribution of Neos, with Satomi selling them in the US and her brother in Japan.

As a final thought, I suppose I should concede that these plants, whose beautiful leaves and roots can be appreciated year around (if you, like me, trick yourself into finding those things interesting), also have admittedly lovely, fragrant, often long-lasting flowers – for those of you that care about such things. The plants themselves are also fairly hardy and can easily be grown in San Diego County.

My journey to Japan was an amazing experience filled with fun, warm-hearted people. I hope to return someday to continue exploring the fascinating world of these beautiful orchids. I would also like to thank Peter Lin and Carol Beule, who helped me prepare for the trip and provided valuable context to me while I was there, as well as Kioshige Negi, a Japanese grower who hosts Peter and Carol, who was invaluable in helping to translate the Japanese for us.


