Tim Culbertson: Sarcochilus: Gems of Spring

Although I teach middle school kids for a living, one of my passions has always been plants. I began growing orchids as an offshoot from working at Longwood Gardens in Philadelphia just after college. From the beginning it was all about verv Paphiopedilums, particularly awarded and select clones of historic importance, of which my collection numbers nearly 3000. While I love finding old, rare stepping stones in Paph breeding, I also do a little hybridizing of my own, and growing up my own babies is a blast. I am an accredited judge with the American Orchid Society, and have served in various capacities with various orchid societies in California and on the East Coast. I love meeting other people who like orchids too, and doing so often finds me traveling to shows, vendors, and people's greenhouses



to see the latest and greatest in new hybrids and to get the best orchid gossip. I like to be involved in plants as much as possible: in addition to Longwood, I've worked at the Smithsonian Institution tending to their orchids, and for years for the United States National Arboretum, collecting rare plants and documenting cultivated species and hybrids for their herbarium. In short, I really like plants.

For the September SDCOS meeting, I'll be sharing a presentation entitled "Sarcochilus: Gems of Spring". These plants are easy to grow and flower, are vigorous, and have low cultural demands; they are natives of Australia and will grow easily outdoors in Southern California. Tremendous advancements in breeding Sarcochilus have been made recently, and I will share some of these with you, as well as help identify some of the important parents in the backgrounds of new and modern colors found in this genus. By the end of this presentation, you will have a new appreciation of what goes into breeding trends for these types of plants, as well as an appreciation of their beautiful flowers and ease-of-growth.

Tim will supply the plants for this month's plant opportunity table. Among the plants he will bring are some of the newest, modern, cutting-edge *Sarcochilus* species and hybrids, so come prepared to purchase (or win through our raffles!) a few *Sarcochilus* orchids, absolute gems with colorful flowers and miniature size.

Culture Class, September 5, 6:30 PM Joseph Hewson: How to Make a Terrarium for Orchids

I'm from San Diego and have always liked wildlife and nature. My real passion for this started with people and programs I saw on TV, and what I experienced in person, including at the zoo. I also grew up with various houseplants (including orchids), my first exposure to nature. My aunt bought me the first orchid that was officially mine. It is a small white Phalaenopsis. That was almost five years ago.

Today, I have a collection of over seventy different orchids, including *Phalaenopsis*, *Cattleyas*, and *Zygopetalums*. What interests me about orchids is their diversity and history. I would argue that they are one of the most important flower species in cultures all around the world. I also find it interesting that there are so many varieties within the same genus as well. I started my YouTube channel, Die Hard Orchids

(https://www.youtube.com/@diehardorchids), because I want to educate people about orchids and how to care for them. I want to eventually travel to different places and observe them in the wild, and then find a way to replicate that at home. I work for the San Diego Zoo Wildlife Alliance in food service; but wildlife and conservation will forever be my first professions.

My culture class presentation is titled "How to Make a Terrarium for Orchids". I will cover the basics of terrarium building, the different elements you can use, and, especially, the orchids. The class will consist of a 10-minute talk, a 15-minute demonstration, and five minutes of questions and answers.

Congratulations to our winners:

Dave Rimlinger won the Best of Show James & Lise Wright Award and the Forrest Robinson Cultural Award for his stunning specimen *Brassia verrucosa*. This huge and superbly grown plant with its abundance of flowers was a worthy winner. Well done, Dave!

Peter Tobias took home the Siv Garrod Most Unusual Species Award for his *Gongora scaphoglottis.* This large and exotic hanging orchid sported 10 long and fully bloomed spikes. It was a great example of the variety on display in our large species sections.

I, Debby Halliday, won the People's Choice Award for my *Dendrobium guibertii v. griffithianum*. This was particularly satisfying as it is one of those species that doesn't hold its flowers very long. In fact I rejected it on Friday for not being open enough, only to discover on Saturday morning that it was more than ready. It continued to open throughout the weekend until it had all its hanging plumes open in their golden glory. I'm just realizing that all our award winners were species this time. I suspect that is another first.

Thank you and great job everyone! The public seemed to really enjoy the show and the room was always busy. As always, a shout out to our volunteers. We cannot put on these shows without you! Special thanks to George Pflaum who took over Jack Schaefer's duties. He put my pencil layouts into CAD and he and his crew transformed 101 into a beautiful show space in a very efficient and professional manner. This was my first park show as chair, and I hope you are as thrilled as I am at what we all created! Go SDCOS!

People's Choice in July Debby Halliday, Show Chair

We had our People's Choice voting at the July Show in the Park as always. Here is how it turned out.

- 435 guests voted.
- 99 different orchids were nominated.
- 27 growers had at least one plant chosen as someone's favorite.

The top ten vote getters accounted for 40% of the votes; their names are below. Note the 3-way tie for 6^{th} and another tie for 9^{th} .

Congratulations to our winners. Congratulations also to all who had plants chosen.

It's fun to see what people like, but the real purpose of the People's Choice voting is to get our guests to slow down and really appreciate our orchids. It works remarkably well. They take their votes seriously. People study the choices carefully before awarding some lucky plant their ultimate vote of approval. It's a win-win for everyone.

Through the ballots, we also learned about how people found our show. By far the most important at 50%, was the signs we put all around the park. Another 11% just stopped in while walking by. This accounts for 61% of our traffic. Another 14% have learned about it at another orchid show. 7% learned about it from a friend or relative. 6% found us online through calendars and social media. The final 12% found us in other ways. We can see that getting the word out in many ways makes a difference.

Thank you all for your role in introducing the wider public to the fascinating world of orchids!
