GENERAL MEETING- June 5, 7:30 PM Karen Muir-Maxillarias

Our speaker for June will be Karen Muir and her topic will be *Maxillaria*. The Maxillarias are among the most widespread and diverse orchid genera of tropical America. They contain spectacular large flowered species and charming miniatures. The genus contains over 650 species with many still to be described. Karen will share with us examples of these spectacular species and discuss their culture. Many Maxillarias are good outdoor growers in San Diego.

Karen is originally from Michigan where she began raising orchids around 1975. Karen became an accredited American Orchid Society Judge in 1997. In 1998, she was transferred by her Company, Lincoln Mercury, to Irvine, California and retired in January 2002. She has served 5 years as the American Orchid Society Chair of the Pacific South Judging

Region and has traveled to Canada, Guatemala, Peru, Ecuador, Brazil, South Africa, England and Japan to attend and judge orchid shows. Karen resides in Laguna Niguel, CA.



What's in a Name? Why Orchid Names are Important

This is a subject that I haven't gone over in a couple of years, and considering that our job as a Society is to promote orchid education, I have been remiss in my recent responsibilities in this particular (alliterative) area.

In Romeo and Juliet, Shakespeare, Juliet asks:

"What's in a name? That which we call a rose by any other name would smell as sweet,"

And then she says a bunch of romantic crap about Romeo, suggesting it doesn't matter that he's a Montague. Of course, we all know where this story ends; Juliet may have asked what was in a name, but without the bitter feud between two families bearing two different names there would have been no tragedy and therefore nothing to make a play out of. It turns out that orchid names can likewise make all the difference between a generic relationship and something *really* worth writing home about.

Did you ever go to an orchid show and you noticed that one vendor was selling Oncidium Sharry Baby for \$20, but another vendor was selling Oncidium Sharry Baby 'Sweet Fragrance' AM/AOS for \$40 and you asked yourself "Why would I buy the same plant for twice as much?" so you went with the cheaper plant? Then, when it finally bloomed, the flowers might not have been as big or have smelled as chocolatey as you remembered.

This is because there's a crucial difference between Oncidium Sharry Baby and Oncidium Sharry Baby 'Sweet Fragrance' AM/AOS. Oncidium Sharry Baby is *any* orchid that has Onc. Jamie Sutton and Onc. Honolulu as its two parents, while Onc. Sharry Baby 'Sweet Fragrance' is a particular *cultivar* of Onc. Sharry Baby, and the AM/AOS part means that it earned an Award of Merit from the American Orchid Society. Every correctly or ethically labeled Onc. Sharry Baby 'Sweet Fragrance' should be a division of the original plant awarded by the AOS, and will therefore have identical genes and be capable of producing flowers that are identical in quality and fragrance to those originally awarded by the AOS judges.

So, when you buy a plant called Onc. Sharry Baby 'Sweet Fragrance', you know exactly what you're getting into. You know how big the blooms should be, how many of them there should be, what color they should be, and how they should smell, because everything is supposed to be identical to that original awarded plant. Conversely, when you buy something called Onc. Sharry Baby, the flowers could be large or small, brown or red, with white or pink (or lavender) lips, it might flower once or twice a year, and it might smell like vanilla or chocolate or bad chardonnay. This is because the genes of Onc. Sharry Baby can be wildly different from each other, as any offspring of the cross between Onc. Honolulu and Onc. Jamie Sutton will have that name.

Ergo, the \$40 Sharry Baby costs twice as much because the award means the plant will be a reliable performer, and you don't exactly know what you're going to get in the \$20 plant.

If any readers happen to grow fruit trees, you

may have wondered why you don't just plant the pit of that awesome avocado you bought the other day from Vons and made into guacamole, or the seeds of that tasty Valencia orange you made into juice for your breakfast. This is because the seed that turns into a tree has been pollinated by another parent, and reproduction can cause a staggering amount of genetic variation, very likely making the offspring of that delicious fruit you ate very different. So you end up with three orange trees 20 years and thousands of gallons of water later with fruit so sour it's bitter and that isn't even good for making into marmalade, like I have in my backyard.

So when you buy an orchid hybrid like Sharry Baby (and you can tell the plant is a hybrid when it has been properly named, because the second and following words will be capitalized to tell you that, as in Oncidium Sharry Baby), paying more for a particular cultivar (the name that appears in the single quotes after the hybrid name, as in Oncidium Sharry Baby 'Sweet Fragrance'), particularly if it has been awarded by the AOS or Royal Horticultiral Society (RHS) or like organization, is often completely worth the money.

Species orchids, the ones not crossed by people and that occur in the wild (or did at one time) can likewise be denoted with proper naming habits. When you read the tag of an orchid and want to know if it is a species, the second word after the genus should be lowercase, as in *Oncidium eheirophorum*. If the tag has been printed by machine, you'll also see a species name in italics, as I did above; on a handwritten tag the only way someone unfamiliar with the plant will know it's a species is if the person who wrote the tag took the care

to make sure the species name was lowercase.

Following correct naming conventions is further important because primary hybrids crosses made from two species-often have the names of people, making them sound like species, which are always named for people, places, or color and structure. I remember passing on purchasing a Schomburgkia Thompsoniana at a show once because someone whom I thought was smarter than me told me that the capital "T" meant it was a hybrid. This was true, but the vendor selling the orchid mistakenly put an uppercase "T" where a lowercase "t" should have been on the tag, deterring this particular species collector from a sale. Similarly, I have seen plants like Cymbidium Pumilow (a hybrid) spelled with a lowercase "p" and exhibited in the species section at shows alongside plants with much smaller flowers that were selected by insects, not men. Talk about unfair.

So what's in a name? For Romeo and Juliet, it was a play-worthy double suicide over icky unrequited teen love. For those who care to pay attention because they want to maximize the pleasure they get from their orchid collections, names tell us whether a plant is a species or a hybrid, whether it has particularly awesome flowers for its type, whether the plant might be more likely to win an award at a show, whether we'll pay more for the plant, whether the plant will have resale value or will one day get the Conservation Committee a healthy donation, whether we should buy it at all because that's what we like to collect, and when we Google the correctly spelled name of the plant replete with proper conventions adhered to—exactly how to grow it.



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Letter From the Editor

Dear SDCOS,

May and June don't seem to be too gray and gloomy, respectively, but I'm sure as soon as I write this and it gets printed that will change. But the same factors that are making this a high pollen count year and a great year for biting insects seem to be in play right now, with mild and clear weather bringing our plants' growth rates into full swing. I swear my bananas grew 6" over Memorial Day weekend just because the soil finally warmed up.

Now if pollen counts are high this year, that also probably means that you'll have to be more vigilant about weeds invading your orchid pots than you were last summer. Make sure to remove dandelions before they go to seed or you'll have a hard time eradicating them from your growing area. When you remove a dandelion, also make sure to remove the entire taproot, as it contains enough starches to grow the rest of the plant right back if you leave it in the pot and just shear off the rest of the plant at mix level.

Anything you have growing in your pots that looks like what it colloquially called "clover" is probably Oxalis and also needs to be removed because it will fix no nitrogen for the benefit of the orchid. Good companion plants for orchids are things like *Nepenthes*, *Pinguicula*, sundews, and *Tillandsia*, not random nightshades, cheeseweed, grasses, and Chenopodiums from God-knows-where.

So when weeds rear up heir ugly heads, be proactive and get them early, before their root systems become entangled in your orchids. The smaller they are, the

easier they are to remove, and the less water and nitrogen they'll take away from your plants.
