# Raymond Harry Brandt, Jr. April 30, 1921 - February 18, 2013

Our society recently lost one of our long time members, Ray Brandt, who was known to his family as "Uncle Ray." Ray was born in River-



side, California and lived most of his life in California with the exception of living in Florida for a few years. Hе graduated from San Diego High School and shortly thereafter, signed up for military service from 1943 1951. to served in World War II and also

the Korean War. On returning to the San Diego area, he built a couple of homes, one in Oceanside, just steps from the ocean where he began growing and selling orchids under the name "Beach Boy Orchids." It was during this period that his friendship with Dave Reid began. He and Dave sold orchids together at our Spring Shows. Besides wanting to be closer to his family, the climate for growing orchids next to the ocean was not the best. He moved to a beautiful home in El Cajon where he really loved the area and the weather and where his orchids grew better. In addition to his orchids, Ray also enjoyed growing roses.

His orchids were truly his prized hobby. He spent many hours building his greenhouse and worked with his orchids daily. When he was only able to get around with his wheelchair, his relatives, Jolyne and Al, would bring the orchids that he would pick out each month to take to the meetings to share with

our members. He would sit outside on the patio and work on the ones he chose to take to society meetings. He typically brought in enough plants to share that would cover two tables.

He was a member of the San Diego Orchid Society for many years and participated in the monthly meetings by sharing his orchids and his knowledge with the members. When asked about his secrets for growing his orchids, he was always willing to share his tricks and secrets freely. One of his secrets was that he would use warm water to water his plants. "Who wants to wake up to a cold shower?" Another trick was that his greenhouse has all of the orchids suspended above the benches so that bugs couldn't gain access to the pots. His Vandas all had Spanish moss wrapped around the roots to help keep the humidity up. When asked about which orchids he liked best, he would tell the guestioner that the bigger and more colorful the orchid was, the better he liked it. One of his favorite orchids was Vanda Queen of Thailand. He would always get ribbons for the orchids that he chose to take to the society shows. He always volunteered and showed his orchids in the big Spring Orchid Shows at the Masonic Temple in Mission Valley.

He was also very faithful each week to make the long trip to his good friend, Dave Reid's home to help him separate orchids and replant them into pots. He cherished his friendship with Dave Reid. He also loved the many wonderful friendships that he made over the many years from being a member of the San Diego Orchid Society.

Ray will truly be missed by everyone who knew him, as he has left a legacy for others to follow. We cherish his life and his memory will go on for many years to come.

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## When to Water

Last month we discussed *How to Water* and one of our members suggested I run an article on *when* to water also so I could finish clearing up any confusion any of our members may have about timing and watering. I initially flatly refused the request, but then he dared me, so now we have an article.

When to water your orchids is the part of orchid culture that makes them seem more like Gremlins than plants. I remember watching a Nova special on PBS on orchids over 10 years ago shortly after I started growing them and the narrator saying "...and no matter what you do, never, ever water them after noon." I remembered thinking "What could the orchid possibly do if I water it at 12:01? Turn evil? Multiply itself?"

To complicate the issue of when to water, let me share the following anecdote: A few years ago, I decided to be the first person in North America to successfully grow the Australian terrestrial orchid Thelymitra nuda, also called the Sun Orchid or Spotted Sun Orchid. It has a round, powder blue nonresupinate flower (meaning upside down for an orchid) with a fuzzy white callous on the lip. The problem with my goal, however, was that when it's winter in Australia it's summer here because of the Earth's axis. I received a flask filled with a bunch of seedlings that were so mature they were about to rot unless I deflasked and potted them soon. The problem with repotting them was that it was now summer, and Thelymitra rot when you get them wet and the temperature is over about 80 degrees. So I had to be able to move the plants out of the flask and into a compot and somehow establish them over the course of that summer without watering them. This is probably why no one you know grows Thelymitras.

Obviously, the problem of when to water is compounded by the sheer diversity of orchids, with the *Thelymitra* example being perhaps the most fraught with difficulty. Luckily most orchids are not like Thelymitras, and the watering rules that I am about to share will work for practically anything.

The other thing to keep in mind is that depending on how you're growing your orchids, the type of mix they're growing in, and the water requirements of each individual plant, your orchids may all need water at different times. Unfortunately, when most of us water our orchid collections, we just water everything because it is near impossible to remember what each individual plant needs when. I have known some internationally recognized professional orchid growers who always kill Habenaria because it's impossible for them to remember to leave that group of plants on the bench alone for a couple of months in winter to induce them to bloom again. Often this may be because they're growing mounted orchids that need frequent watering right over the plants that need to dry out all winter, because there simply wasn't any more space in the greenhouse.

Growing mounted plants on a pipe right over potted plants ensures that everything in your collection is going to get water at the same time. But if your potted orchids are all growing in fine fir bark that has a tendency to stay soaked for a while, you could be overwatering your potted orchids on the bench in order to just keep your mounted orchids above them hydrated. Growing potted orchids that are right under your mounted plants in very coarse fir bark might be the answer to not overwatering your potted plants in this situation.

Understanding the relationship between light, water, humidity, and temperature is an important key to making the sometimes elaborate mental calculus necessary for an accurate determination of whether an indi-

vidual orchid needs water or not. Often it is our misunderstanding of the interplay of these variables that leads to sunburned plants when we move them outside every May to benefit from the increased air movement and humidity of a summer outdoors, for instance. This also explains why our plants always look so desiccated after we bring them inside for winter if we continue treating them the same way we were treating them when they were outside.

When temperatures increase, everything about your plants will happen faster. They will usually photosynthesize quicker and respire and transpire more, requiring more water and humidity. If the temperature goes up and you're already watering every plant every day and don't have the time to water twice a day, lowering the light levels that your orchids experience is a good strategy to compensate for the increased amount of water your plants will be using.

Likewise if the temperature suddenly drops, you'll need to decrease the amount of water your plants get, decrease the humidity, or increase the amount of light your plants are getting to keep them in optimal growth. (And don't forget to fertilize your orchids more when they're actively growing than when they're dormant in winter.)

When the marine layer burns off at the end of June or July, your outdoor plants will be getting much more light than they did during "June gloom," so watering them more or increasing the humidity will help them compensate for the change since they will be using more of the water in their environment than they were using before.

But what happens if you water an orchid after noon? Most of the time it just gets hydrated and generally speaking, no orchid hobbyist should worry about killing his or her plants because he or she watered at 12:01.

Ever. But what we want to make sure we avoid doing is creating a situation in which orchid leaves are still wet when the sun goes down and stay wet late into the evening. These kinds of conditions cause the crowns to rot in monopodial orchids, which almost always universally kills them. Also, wet orchid leaves at night often result in unsightly spotting and can engender conditions that lead to fungal outbreaks that kill entire plants. In other words, the only time you want to water in the afternoon or early evening is when the weather is hot enough that the plant leaves will dry completely before reaching the minimum temperature that night.

In the spirit of *How to Water*, let me break this complicated universe down into a series of discrete, easy-to follow rules about *when* to water:

- 1. Water in the earlier part of the day, except when it is hot during summer.
- 2. Water mounted orchids a lot, even every day, as you cannot overwater them.
- 3. Water potted orchids when the pseudobulbs shrivel, when the pot feels too light for the plant, or when the moisture meter you're using tells you the plant is dry. Keep same size plants in same size commercial plastic pots when possible to make it easier to weigh the plant if you have trouble.
- 4. Water more often if your orchids are burning from too much light.
- 5. Be careful about what you grow under mounted orchids. You may not want to get those plants that wet, and may need to adjust their growth media so it absorbs less water (or is more coarse).
- 6. Water more in summer and less in winter so that the amount of water synchronizes with the plant's growth rate. Remember that some species and a few hybrids require dry winter (or summer) rests.


